Insurance Report- Kylie Fennell

APSA has continued to supply to its members insurance at a very reasonable cost. At this stage I am not sure if there will be an increase next year. If there is, I would hope that it would be minimal.

If you wish to make an Accident Claim you can go directly to the World Wide Sports Insurance website <http://www.wysi.com.au>.

WWSI advise the following steps.

- Step 1.** Simply contact one of our offices and notify the circumstances of your loss (time, date and injury or damage suffered).
- Step 2.** Request a claim form from your Account Manager and advise if there is any need for emergency treatment or repairs.
- Step 3.** Return all your claim documents to your broker upon completion along with any receipts, police reports, photos and other relevant information.

All accident reports will need to be signed off by APSA and ISA.

Please make note: The loss of income is for full time workers only. This means you must work at least 20 hours per week and you will need to have documents to support this. They will pay up to 75% of net income of full-time workers after the 7 day excess, limited to \$250 per week (payable for 52 weeks).

If there is any Public Liability or Professional indemnity issues you will need to contact WWSI direct by phone.

I would also like take this opportunity to point out to everyone that APSA advised all coaches who travel overseas for work to have individual travel insurance. There are many companies who offer this, so shop around and read the fine print. Some Policies do not cover Winter Sports.
